The NPDC was funded by the Office of Special Education Programs, US Dept. of Education from 2007-2014 with a "goal to promote the use of evidence-based practices (EBPs) for children and youth with ASD, birth to 22 years of age." NDPC has identified 27 EBPs that "have been shown through scientific research to be effective when implemented correctly with students with ASD." This link leads directly to the evidence-based practices that NPDC has determined. Most of these practices have additional information sheets that describe the intervention in detail.

There are modules for basic information on autism as well as for most of the evidence based practices and other emerging interventions. The primary target for this information are other professionals working with families and individuals (usually children) with autism. In some cases, there is information specific to Ohio residence included in these modules or other information from OCALI. Nevertheless, these modules provide solid information on a wide variety of topics related to autism.
